

# Vancouver Division of Family Practice Physician Peer Engagement Program IMPACT REPORT



### **OVERVIEW**





In its first year, the Physician Peer Engagement Program brought Vancouver family physicians and their teams together to connect, exchange ideas, and share experiences. Applicants proposed event ideas and topics they felt were relevant and timely to the delivery of primary care in their community.

Our program objectives were to enhance community, foster collaboration across clinics, and share ideas, lived experiences, and spark innovation.





### THE PROGRAM IN NUMBERS


#### Events were attended by:

of Physician Organizers said they would participate in the program again if it were to be offered in the future.



A slight majority of events were held in person.

### \$54,000

in sessional payments provided to compensate family practitioners, clinic managers and MOAs for organizing and/or participating in the events.

There were a total of 19 events, ranging in size from 3 to 20 participants, with a total of 199 participants from 48 clinics.

# **KEY THEMES OF DISCUSSIONS**

We invited Family Physicians to collaborate with others in their community and to organize an event on any topic they felt was important and timely. These events covered a wide range of topics.

#### **Clinic Workflow Optimization**

Including workflow, practice management, documentation, clinic booking, patient intake, PAS, and improving communications within clinic teams.

#### Physician Wellness

Including mental health, peer to peer support, work satisfaction, and networking.

#### Patient Care

Including mental health resources, devastating diagnoses, trauma and death, improving access to contraception and maternity care.

### **Clinic Technologies**

Including software, AI, and cybersecurity.

#### **Clinic Security**

Including physical security, staff safety, and emergency planning.









## EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

### Here are some of the event highlights Physician Organizers shared:

★ We explored various topics that could lead to improved practice efficiencies, increased physician satisfaction, and quality improvement.

- ★ New ideas and advice about clinic operations including advice for building an Indigenous Lens to care as well as plans for future collaborations in this area.
  - One [of my event's] participants with a passion for teaching shared her resources on recruiting medical students and residents.

Unstructured sharing allowed for peer support, networking and collaboration.

★ Improved MOA booking and Clinician communication.

★ Shared tips on MOA-physician ratios.

★ Improved referral network.

Having basically worked in isolation for so long, I really find it refreshing to be reminded of the importance of physically getting together and discussing things with colleagues.

## MORE EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

★ Improved practice management and documentation best practices.

★ A plan for starting a Balint-style clinical support program for MDs and NPs.

★ Each participating physician plans to make specific changes to the clinic's workflow to ensure patient care is enhanced.

## OUTCOMES & FEEDBACK

We asked Physician Organizers to share which Primary Care Network (PCN) or Patient Medical Home (PMH) outcomes their events achieved:

Enhanced patient care	89%
Improved clinic operations or workflow	89%
Enhanced team-based care	58%
Improved physician/staff experience and/or wellness	53%
Improved patient access	47%

Enhanced patient experience & culturally safe care	37%
Improved continuity of care	37%
Improved coordination of care	32%
Increased attachment	21%
Increased social determinants of health	5%

### Program Feedback

89% of Physician Organizers said that their event would not have happened without the support of this program.

The Physician Peer Engagement Program strongly encouraged us to set a date and put pen to paper. While...our discussion may have happened in a less organized fashion, the program allowed us to be structured, set goals, and feel our time was valued.
